

Tips for Encouraging Students to Invest Time and Effort into Their Learning

- Frame Gen Ed assignments to encourage perspective taking rather than memorization or acquisition of information. Engaging in perspective—taking takes time!
- Scaffold your assignments. Scaffolding is one way to guide students to invest time and effort into their learning and involves breaking up a large project or assignment into smaller steps or chunks and providing feedback each step of the way. <u>This resource from University at Buffalo</u> provides an excellent explanation of scaffolding and examples to try out in your Gen Ed course(s)!
- Be explicit about how much time each section of your assignment/project will take. You can put estimated timeframes on your assignment instructions and/or on your D2L site. Although the exact timing for students to complete work is hard to determine, this resource from Rice University can you help you estimate the time of your reading and/or writing.
